Brown Bag Mediation Program

The United States Bankruptcy Court, Eastern District of New York Chapter 11 Lawyers' Advisory Subcommittee on Mediation will host a <u>virtual brown bag lunch webinar</u> on **July 27, 2022, from 12:30 p.m. – 2:00 p.m.** entitled "When and How a Case is Sent – A Quick Case Study." The objective of the webinar is to explore in a brief vignette style, with some discussion overlay, how and when disputes can be sent to Mediation. The panel members will explore some of the concerns and questions that parties may work through in considering Mediation as an option to resolve a pending dispute. Some of the Judges in our District will share the considerations they give in raising Mediation as an option and the mechanics of the referral process. We hope that this continued exploration of Mediation as a tool will better educate practitioners on considering it as an option to assist their clients.

Email Updates From the United States Courts

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Bankruptcy Threshold Adjustment and Technical Corrections Act (BTATC) Act

On June 21, 2022, the <u>"Bankruptcy Threshold Adjustment and Technical Corrections Act" (BTATC) (Pub. L. No. 117-151)</u> was signed into law by the President. The new law has a direct impact on the bankruptcy system and the administration of bankruptcy cases. The BTATC includes three major provisions:

- 1) Extends for two years the increase of the amount of debt (up to \$7,500,000) allowed to be carried by debtors to qualify for small business reorganization under subchapter V (applies retroactively to cases commenced on or after March 27, 2022, and with respect to a case that was commenced on or after March 27, 2020, and before June 21, 2022, is pending on June 21, 2022),
- 2) Increases, for two years, the debt limit for individuals filing for bankruptcy under Chapter 13 (to less than \$2,750,000) and allows both secured and unsecured debt to count towards this single limit (effective June 21, 2022), and
- 3) Provides technical amendments to the BAIA (to 28 U.S.C. § 589(a) specifically), which are effective as of October 1, 2021.

Additionally, the BTATC reinstates the definition of "debtor" for determining eligibility to proceed under subchapter V chapter 11 that was in effect from March 27, 2020 to March 27, 2022. As a result, Line 13 of Official Form 101, and Line 8 of Official Form 201, have been updated to reflect the change.

New Chapter 7 Trustee Payments Set to Begin

Bankruptcy courts will begin processing the new chapter 7 trustee payment, an additional \$60 per case, to eligible chapter 7 bankruptcy trustees for applicable cases, such as chapter 7 cases filed on or after January 12, 2021, through September 30, 2021, or chapter 11, 12, or 13 cases filed on or after January 12, 2021, that are subsequently converted to chapter 7, on or before September 30, 2021.

To receive the additional payment, eligible chapter 7 trustees must certify they have rendered services pursuant to the <u>regulations</u> via the filing of a "Trustee Services Rendered Pursuant to 330(e)" event in an individual bankruptcy court's Case Management/Electronic Case Files (CM/ECF) system. Trustees should allow time for their local bankruptcy court clerk's office to process payments before inquiring about payment status.

In accordance with the <u>Bankruptcy Administration Improvement Act of 2020</u>, chapter 7 trustees are eligible to receive additional payment if they render services in cases filed:

- under chapter 7 on or after January 12, 2021, to the end of fiscal year 2026;
- or originally filed under chapter 11, 12, or 13, on or after January 12, 2021, and subsequently converted to chapter 7 on or before the end of fiscal year 2026.

Subsequent annual payments will be issued after the end of each applicable fiscal year. Amounts available for payment are determined annually based on the available balance in the United States Trustee System Fund and the case count of new chapter 7 filings and cases converted to chapter 7 during that fiscal year.

Cases Filed on or After May 15, 2022

The <u>information</u> provided is applicable to Official Bankruptcy Forms 122A-1 (Chapter 7 Statement of Your Current Monthly Income), 122A-2 (Chapter 7 Means Test Calculation), 122C-1 (Chapter 13 Statement of Your Current Monthly Income and Calculation of Commitment Period), and 122C-2 (Chapter 13 Calculation of Your Disposable Income). Debtors completing these forms are required to enter income and expense information and then make calculations using the entered information. Some of the information needed to complete the forms comes from the Census Bureau and the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

BANKRUPTCY CASE FILING STATISTICS

Bankruptcy Filings Continue Steady Drop

Bankruptcy filings continued a steep two-year-long fall that coincided with the start of the Coronavirus (COVID-19). Filings fell 16.5 percent for the 12-month period ending March 31, 2022. According to statistics released by the Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts, the March 2022 annual bankruptcy filings totaled 395,373, compared with 473,349 cases in the previous year.

Filings fell both for businesses and non-business bankruptcies, compared with the year ending March 2021. Non-business filings fell by a total of 15.7 percent, while business filings fell 33.9 percent.

This year's 12-month filing total for the quarter ending March 31 is slightly more than half of the total reported in March 2020, when the pandemic began. That year's 12-month total was 764,282.
